

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Happy New Year 2022 to everyone! I hope and pray that this year brings all of you wonderful gifts and blessings from our Lord; true peace throughout the world, and that COVID (and all of its variants) will be in the rear-view mirror! May the Lord bless and protect all of us, and that we grow in holiness and love of the Lord in 2022 and every day of our lives!

PASTOR It is interesting how the Church arranges the readings for the Christmas season; that one weekend it's the feast of the Epiphany, as magi (or astrologers) from the east go to Bethlehem to bring the newborn King gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh. And the last weekend of the Christmas season is the Baptism of our Lord in the Jordan river, as He is baptized by His second cousin John the Baptist, as Jesus Christ begins His public ministry at the age of 30.

The feast of the Epiphany illustrates how Jesus Christ came into the world not for just the chosen people of God, but for all peoples throughout the world; how the magi followed the star to Bethlehem, and when they arrive at the manger scene, they are filled with the awe and glory of the Son of God in their midst. And the Baptism of the Lord illustrates the how the Lord, in His humanity, needed to be baptized in order to do the ministry that His Father sent Him to do on earth.

We know that much of the Lord's life is a mystery; that much of it is not proclaimed in the Scriptures. We know that the Lord's lifespan on earth was short – 33 years – and yet it was the most powerful 33 years in the history of the world! At the Lord's Baptism in the Jordan river, it is the first and only time in the history of the world that the Trinity – the Father, Son and Holy Spirit - are truly 'present' to humankind; as Jesus Christ is baptized by John in the Jordan; the Holy Spirit descends upon Him in visible form as a dove, and a voice from Heaven says: "You are my beloved Son. On you my favor rests."

We are also beloved sons and daughters of the Heavenly Father; baptized in Christ as priests, prophets, and kings; priests to serve others, prophets to proclaim the Gospel message of love and the hope of Heaven, and kings to know that the kingdom of God is in our midst and in our hearts! Our faith is a mystery, there is no question about that. But that mystery is trusting in the One who walked the world over 2,000 years ago, who is the light that no darkness can overcome, and that light of love that when faithfully followed will lead us to the glory of Heaven for all eternity!

Celebrating FIFTY years of living the Eucharist: "Give them something to eat..."

The Eucharist as the embodiment of Love.

In the past twenty-five years, the Eucharist has been a prominent theme in official Catholic documents, especially from the last three popes. Pope Francis in his exhortation The Joy of the Gospel writes: "God's word, listened to and celebrated, above all in the Eucharist, nourishes and inwardly strengthens Christians, enabling them to offer an authentic witness to the Gospel in daily life." This presentation attempts to find the connection between cult, creed, and code, to the extent that how we pray shapes what we believe and how we act as Christians living in the world.

The Eucharist and Social Justice.

How we pray should translate itself into how we live. Liturgists like to use the shorthand tag lex orandi, lex agendi or the rule of prayer leads to the rule of action. This lecture explores the relationship between Eucharist and ethics, between liturgy and life. It explores the declaration of the 2005 Synod on the Eucharist The Eucharist moves Christians to a commitment of justice in today's world..."

Michael S. Driscoll is a priest of the Diocese of Helena and professor emeritus in the theology department at the University of Notre Dame. He is the founding director of the Graduate Program in Sacred Music as well as the undergraduate interdisciplinary minor in Liturgical Music Ministry at the University of Notre Dame. His scholarly interests are in the area of liturgy and sacramental theology, co-authoring a book with Michael Joncas entitled. The Order of Mass: A Roman Missal Study Edition and Workbook (Chicago: Liturgical Training Publications, 2011). He served as president of the North American Academy of Liturgy (2002-03) and was a member of the executive counci (2002-08) of the international ecumenical association Societas Liturgica. In 2013, he finished his three-year term as president of the Catholic Academy of Liturgy and is currently the treasurer.
