**LENT, A TIME FOR COMING CLOSER TO GOD**—In his reflection Fr. Francis Fernandez explains, during this time of Lent we stimulate our souls a deep and effective desire to go back once again. To return like the prodigal son, to be closer to God. Lent is the best time for us to bring about our conversion. If we stay close to Christ, we will always find the cure for our lack of ardor and re-charge ourselves with the strength to overcome by ourselves. It is time for each one of us to recognize that he or she is being urged on by Jesus Christ. Those of us who sometimes feel inclined to put off this decision should know that, now, the moment has come. In the reading of the book of Genesis for Monday of the 6<sup>th</sup> week of the year, (Gn 4, 1-15, 25), the story pertains to Cain and Abel. Cain and Abel were born to Adam and Eve, and Abel became the keeper of the flocks and Cain was the tiller of the soil. In due time, God rewarded Abel for his work with the flocks while Cain was not rewarded. Cain became very jealous and angry towards Abel because he was awarded and Cain was not. God's reasoning for Abel's being rewarded is not known.

Cain entices Abel to go out into the field and Cain kills his brother due to his jealousy, anger and rage towards Abel. The Lord asks Cain where his brother is (knowing fully the answer) and Cain lies to the Lord: "Am I my brother's keeper?" Then the Lord chastises Cain, telling him that "your brother's blood cries out from the soil!" The Lord tells Cain that he will receive his just punishment; that the soil will no longer produce for him, and that he shall be a wanderer on the earth.

Cain is very upset about the sin that he has committed against God, what he has done to his brother and he fears for his life, because "anyone may kill me at sight..." The Lord promises Cain that no one will do harm to him, and if someone does, "Cain shall be avenged sevenfold..." So Cain is forgiven by the Lord for the murder of his brother, and is given a second chance to do what is right and just, and to live honorably with and for the Lord.

Anger, jealousy and rage are highly-destructive emotions that we need to guard against with all of our hearts. God warns Cain in this reading to be very careful about his anger towards his brother, because "sin is a demon lurking at the door..." But Cain's anger towards his brother got the best of him as he went on to murder his brother. We all have moments of anger and frustration in our lives. Even Jesus was very angry towards the merchants as they were selling their goods in and around the temple area, as He went and flipped over the tables of the merchants. This was a moment of righteous anger for Jesus, because it was not right that the merchants were selling their goods in the temple. We too have justifiable moments of righteous anger, when we get angry about something that we know is not right, such as the taking of millions of innocent human lives through abortion in this country and throughout the world. But we need to temper our righteous anger through prayer, peaceful protests, civic involvement and voting for candidates who will fight to protect the lives of the unborn and the elderly.

We are sinners and we are human. We all have moments of anger and maybe even some moments of jealousy in our lives. But we are also people of faith and reason; called to bring the light of Christ to the world. Cain was forgiven by the Lord for the murder of his brother. And we have experienced the love and mercy of God time and again in our lives. So may we embrace and be so thankful for the love and mercy of God towards us, and put on the armor of light (Jesus Christ), and make no provisions for the desires of the flesh. God bless all of you!
